WEEKLY VOCATION REFLECTION

ADVENT: AN INVITATION TO WAIT ON GOD

On this First Sunday of Advent, the readings set for us a journey of faith, trust and hope. This season gives us a constant invitation to be awake, to wait, to prepare ourselves, and to be alert as we are waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Gospel reading ends with Christ Jesus telling us to "Stay awake."



The word "wait" comes from the Hebrew 'qavah' which means enduring patiently in the confident hope that God will act decisively for the salvation of his people... Those who wait in true faith are renewed with strength so that they can continue to serve the Lord while looking for his saving work.

Waiting for the LORD does not mean sitting back helplessly. St. Paul tells us "so in every way you have been enriched [in Christ] so you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor 1:7). In other words, the Spirit of God is with you. God's grace provides us the strength and energy to walk in confident expectation that God is with us.

Two things come to my mind as we prepare and wait for His coming during this pandemic:

First, the renewal of hearts and minds: 'Why do you let us wander, O Lord, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not?' (Isaiah 63:17). Today, Prophet

Isaiah is reminding us through this prayer of penitence to amend our ways, renew our hearts and find favor in the presence of THE Creator. Mother Church incessantly encourages the faithful to renew and cultivate this ardent desire for his second coming: 'When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming..." (CCC 524).

Second, some may feel that this novel virus has sucked our energy out, drained our confidence, and pushed us into deep dark despair. Know that advent invites us to renew our strength by remembering the marvelous deeds that God has done for all of us. "O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, you are the potter; we are all the work of your hand" (Isaiah 64: 8).

With this in mind, let us look at our own life as we enter into this Advent Season. What is it that we hope for? What is it that we wait for?

May this season bring newness in our lives. May it bring strength and hope. May the prayer of Matthew Kelly resound in our hearts throughout this season: "God of hope, I look to you with an open heart and yearning spirit. During this Advent Season, I will keep alert and awake, listening for your word and keeping to your precepts. My hope is in you."

ADVENT

Advent 2020 begins on November 29th and ends on December 24th.



The Latin word "advent" means "coming": This is the coming of Jesus into the world. As Christians, we use the 4 Sundays of Advent to prepare for the coming of the Lord; the real message of Christmas. In the Medieval times, Advent was a period of fasting during which people's thoughts were directed to the expected second coming of Christ, but in modern times many have forgotten the symbolism and it is primarily a time leading up to Christmas.

The Advent Wreath or Advent Crown symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the Liturgical Calendar. It is an evergreen wreath with four Candles. Three are Purple and One Pink. However, in some traditions. There is a white candle, included in the centre of the arrangement. This one is lit on Christmas Eve at midnight or on Christmas Day. The concept of the Advent wreath originated in the 16th Century among the German Lutherans. However, it was not until three centuries later that the modern Advent wreath took shape. The original Advent wreath was a large wooden ring, (built out of an old cartwheel) with 20 small red candles and 4 large white ones. A small red candle was lit on weekdays and a large white one on Sundays.

As the custom grew and the world modernized, the wreath evolved using evergreen, which is always available, and brings "life" inside the homes during the long winter months. The custom evolved into the smaller wreath and the 4 or 5 candles that we know today.

The candles represent the light of God coming into the world, through the birth of Jesus Christ.

- Week 1: The prophet's Candle Symbolizes Hope (Purple candle is lit).
- Week 2: The Bethlehem Candle Symbolizes Peace and Faith
- Week 3: The Shepherd's Candle Symbolizes Joy
- Week 4: The Angels Candle Symbolizes Love; the Pink candle is lit.

The White candle in the center is the Christ Candle and is lit on Christmas day, when Christ has arrived.

PUBLICATION OF BANNS: MR. PETER ROBINSON



25th ANNIVERSARY OF THE CANONIZA-TION OF ST. EUGENE DE MAZENOD



On December 3, 1995, in the Vatican basilica, during the third year of the second mandate of Father Marcello Zago, OMI as Superior General of the Oblates, Saint Pope John Paul II proclaimed in his eighteenth year of Pontificate:

"For the honor of the Blessed Trinity, the exaltation of the Catholic faith and the increase of the Christian life, by the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, and of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul, and our own, after due deliberation and frequent prayer for divine assistance, and having sought the counsel of many of our brother Bishops, we declare and define Blessed Eugene de Mazenod to be a Saint and we enroll him among the Saints, decreeing that he is to be venerated as such by the whole Church. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

St. Eugene de Mazenod is the Founder of the Missionary Oblate of Mary Immaculate and a saint patron of our Outreach Ministry in the inner-city of Hamilton.
