What Happens Here Doesn't Stay Here

BREAKING DOWN IN ORDER TO BUILD UP

It's go time! It's been the talk of the parish for more than two years and the old St. Patrick School is finally coming down.

Just this past week, Fr. Tony spoke in a homily about his and Fr. Jarek's arrival here at St. Patrick Parish, Hamilton almost 10 years ago. Back then, there was the iconic black wrought iron fencing surrounding the church. I think maybe there were multiple reasons those fences were up. For beautification maybe? To preserve the grounds? To protect parishioners attending masses? Or maybe to keep out the rough-living, down and out and displaced. Those vagrants who were coming and regularly asking for money or for help truly needed it and they still need it today. It's inner-city Hamilton. We are at the gates to the downtown core where the homeless have gathered for decades. We are situated among the largest demographic of second level lodging homes in the city. These lodging homes house many men & women who are dealing with a plethora of mental health issues and they frequent the property. A lot changed when those iron fences came down. Now the Door is home, like a lighthouse in a sea of darkness to the hundreds who need to see that beacon.



This week, the demolition of the school began and the first thing to happen was that fences went up. These fences completely surround the school property, both front and back. Although the added fencing provides the necessary safety barriers, it closes off the parking lot, and more importantly, a couple major access points for our guests to access the Door – very reminiscent of those iron fences that once wrapped around the church.



Is it inconvenient for our guests at the Door and for our parishioners and friends to find parking for masses? Of course. But, the end result in two years' time will be a beautiful new building that will house the new St. Patrick Elementary School and its many students, as well as a new De Mazenod Door Outreach kitchen.

Sometimes we have to put up with inconvenience for the common good. That's why our province, City and Church complied with lockdown procedures twice this year. This is for the good of an entire community. There will be growth all around us – within the new school, within the parish and within the Door ministry. We are excited for the possibilities that these changes will bring.

We've spent a year in this pandemic already, so we know that time passes quickly. Let's just hold on tight and enjoy the ride and see what these changes bring. Sometimes inconveniences are just blessings in disguise.


De Mazenod Door Outreach



VOCATION REFLECTION

COMPELLED BY GOD'S LOVE

"God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us... made us alive together with Christ." Ephesians 2:4

As a young man, having returned home from exile, Eugene de Mazenod was confused about his future and feeling somewhat without direction. One Good Friday, Eugene had a life changing experience of God's rich, merciful love during the veneration of the cross. That experience, which could easily be summed up by Paul's words in the Letter to the Ephesians quoted above, was a turning point in his life and formed and shaped his thinking, teaching and actions for the rest of his life.

Having experienced God's immeasurable love, Eugene gave himself totally to a life of discipleship, no longer concerned with restoring the family fortune or making an advantageous marriage. His response to being loved led him to the priesthood and then to founding the Oblates of Mary Immaculate; his desire and passion was to share that same love with those who experienced it the least in his day. He felt called to "proclaim Good News to the poor", and he strove to fulfill that call every day of his life. That same gift of the Holy Spirit, the charism of St. Eugene de Mazenod, is still present in the church today in the lives and witness of Oblates and Associates and other members of the Mazenodian family.



The Word of God for this Fourth Sunday of Lent invites and challenges us to reflect on our own experiences of God's love for us. Each of us will have our own unique experiences but we are reminded that God's love is poured out on all people. As we experience this gift of love, we are invited to respond. Our natural inclination upon receiving a gift is to respond by giving a gift in return, in gratitude for what we have received. The question for each of us is "Where is God's love calling me, what am I being invited to give in return?" Our first call or vocation is to discipleship, and within that we are also called to respond in unique ways. To what are you being called today?

Our Parish Patron - St. Patrick; a well known Saint who can help us on our Christian journey.

Let's face it – that journey is not for the faint of heart! Many trials and obstacles can arise, and it's often too much to handle on our own. We can all use a little help getting through this life in one piece as we try to build God's kingdom on earth.

St. Patrick, who likely lived in the fifth century,

knew this all too well. When he was 16, he was kidnapped from his father's home in Britain and sold as a slave in Ireland, where he worked as a herdsman. Rather than sending him into despair, his ordeal rekindled his Christian faith. Even after he escaped back to Britain six years later, he nearly starved to death before making his way home.

Most people would have sworn off travel for life at that point, but Patrick felt called to return to Ireland some time later to spread the Gospel. This mission was an amazing success, and his writings offer a fascinating glimpse of the man behind the legends.

The prayer known as St. Patrick's Breastplate can be a source of strength and courage as we make our way in the world, today and every day. Here's a rousing part of that timeless prayer:



Christ, shield me today against wounding.

Christ with me,
Christ before me,
Christ behind me,
Christ in me,
Christ beneath me,
Christ above me,
Christ on my right,
Christ on my left,
Christ when I lie down,
Christ when I sit down,

Christ in the heart of everyone who thinks of me, Christ in the mouth of everyone who speaks of me

> Christ in the eye that sees me, Christ in the ear that hears me.

CELEBRATING ST. PATRICK & ST. JOSEPH (continued)

St. Joseph, in particular, shows us how trust in God, despite uncertainty about the future, is especially important.

We don't know much about him, other than he served as the father of Jesus on earth, could have been a carpenter and that he didn't talk much. Or at least that's the impression you get from the gospels as there isn't a single word coming out of Joseph's mouth in any of the four accounts of the evangelists. But at key moments, Joseph played a vital role

in the life of the child Jesus.

Even before Jesus was born, Joseph had to decide what to do about Mary. He was betrothed to this young woman when he discovered she was pregnant with the unborn Son of God. His culture would have strongly supported a move to denounce her and break off the engagement.

But an angel — God's favourite busybodies — intervened. In a dream, an angel told Joseph to not fear taking Mary as his wife, and informed him that the child she carried was from God.

Joseph decided to ignore his community's custom and have faith that God knew what He was doing. The rest, as they say, is history.

Shortly after Jesus was born, Joseph faced another lifeand-death choice. When Herod sent out his minions to kill the young children in his jurisdiction in an effort to eliminate what he saw as a threat to his dominion — that is Jesus — another angel, again in a dream, told Joseph to take the family to Egypt and wait out the danger. Once again, Joseph had faith enough in God to do as the angel advised. When Herod died and the threat had passed, the family returned to Israel, ultimately settling in Galilee. In both instances, it would have been easier for Joseph to make less onerous choices. But even though he did not know what the future held for him, he obeyed God's instructions.

Very few of us will be instructed by angels in dreams on how to deal with the problems we face in our lives. And at the moment, life is looking rather scary. We do not know how the current global crisis will unfold, or how long it will take for our lives to return to normal. It's quite possible they will never go back to the convenience we took for granted only a short time ago.

Yet, as Joseph showed by his actions, God knows our needs and will not leave us alone to deal with our problems. It is not easy at this time, but we need to dig a little deeper inside to trust in God. It will take some big breaths, and a lot of prayer.

St. Joseph, patron of Canada, pray for us.

To you, O blessed Joseph, do we come in our afflictions, and having implored the help of your most holy Spouse, we confidently invoke your patronage also.

Through that charity which bound you to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God and through the paternal love with which you embraced the Child Jesus, we humbly beg you graciously to regard the inheritance which Jesus Christ has purchased by his Blood, and with your power and strength to aid us in our necessities.

O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, defend the chosen children of Jesus Christ; O most loving father, ward off from us every contagion of error and corrupting influence; O our most mighty protector, be kind to us and from heaven assist us in our struggle with the power of darkness.

As once you rescued the Child Jesus from deadly peril, so now protect God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; shield, too, each one of us by your constant protection, so that, supported by your example and your aid, we may be able to live piously, to die in holiness, and to obtain eternal happiness in heaven.
