BEYOND THE WALLS

What Happens Here Doesn't Stay Here

HOME SWEET HOME?

I'm not sure if any of you have looked at the price of housing in the city of Hamilton over this past year: real estate has skyrocketed. The price of an old war time house is somewhere upwards of \$600,000. I bought one of those same houses, my very first home in 1981 for \$26,900. Wow! That was 40 years ago! And now those same houses are not obtainable or affordable for those classified as 'middle class', let alone for those with low income. This is especially true in the cases of those we serve at De Mazenod Door, many of whom have no income. People from out of town continue to move to Hamilton for housing, because it's much cheaper than for example, in the Toronto and surrounding areas. Who can blame them?

But, what has this housing boom done to the rental market? Have you looked lately? It's through the roof! Can you even fathom paying \$1,500 for an apartment in the downtown core or centre city? Remember the \$500 rooms for rent? They no longer exist. There is nothing obtainable for under a thousand dollars. Folks on any kind of social assistance receive the bare minimum for shelter allowance. A single person on Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) receives a maximum shelter allowance of \$489 dollars. A single individual on Ontario Works (OW) receives a maximum shelter allowance of \$390. Take that in for a moment and try to wrap your head around it. \$390 dollars. It has become unaffordable to live indoors - to have a basic roof over your head, a basic necessity of life. People don't choose to live on the streets. It's handed to many of them.

Something's gotta give. Be it Federal or Provincial or Municipal, something needs to be done. Everything's been said. All levels of Government are aware of this crisis, but it's easy not to think about it when you're home, tucked in for the night, nice and warm with your TV or IPad. We all tune out the outside world. We shut down, turn off our brains and forget about the thousands of people who dream of having our lives, our luxuries - on the out-

side, feeling nothing of what we are feeling.

I worry that if the government doesn't do something to cap rents, we will have a city of homeless with more and more people falling into the homelessness category. People are losing jobs on a constant basis. This pandemic has forced so many small businesses to close. They simply can't hang in there or hang on and have already giv-



en everything they've had to give to get to where they were – many times there is nothing left to give. Many of us are a paycheque or two away from having to give up our homes or cozy apartments - a very frightening yet real threat. I don't know about you, but it scares me to death to think that if I lost my job at 60 years of age, I'd be in trouble. Imagine having nothing else to think about.

I hope this read gives us new perspective when we see a homeless person on the street when we come across them. It gets me in the feels, because they were us once. I pray our government does something to fix this. It's already way past too late.

VOCATION REFLECTION

SIR, WE WISH TO SEE JESUS

The Greeks, the new converts to Judaism came to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. They had seen or heard about Jesus and his extraordinary things that Jesus had done. These Gentiles were curious to see or have a conversation with Jesus. They approached Philip, one of the disciples of Jesus with their request to see Jesus. According to John, the Greeks never got an audience with Jesus. Philip took their request to Andrew, and, together, Andrew and Philip told Jesus, but Jesus did not say yes or no. Instead, he said, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." Probably, Jesus used the image of the grain to speak of his forthcoming passion, death, and resurrection to his disciples.



What do you make of this reference to a grain of wheat falling to the ground and dying today as we reflect on this passage? What does it mean for us today as we enter this Sunday? Somehow death and seeing Jesus are interrelated and interconnected. As followers of Christ, if we want to see Jesus, we must learn to die like the grain which dies and bear fruits. Seeing Jesus means dying to all parts of our life that blinds or hiders us to see a new life. Seeing Jesus means learning to die to resentment, hatred, self-centeredness, obsessions and compulsions, discrimination, and indifference to bear the fruits of love, peace, justice, forgiveness, unity, and solidarity. Henri

Nouwen in his prayer 'A cry for Mercy' elucidates, "Yes, Lord, I have to die.... There is so much in me that needs to die: false attachments, greed and anger, impatience and stinginess". Therefore, in dying to self-life, we discover an abundant and new life as St. Francis of Assisi beautifully says, "it is in dying that we are born to eternal life."

As followers of Jesus, we are challenged by the message and example of Jesus today. The Lenten journey requires us to live more intensely the rhythm of dying and rising so that we may continue to witness Christ and Christian virtues in our lives. As St. Pope John Paul II says, "We must also let him be "seen" somehow through the eloquent witness of our own life (Novo millennio ineunte).

The season of Lent is to give us time once again to die to our old sinful ways of life and rise out of the tomb with Jesus to a new way of life – renewal attitude. The second preface of Lent states, "For you have given your children a sacred time for the renewing and purifying of their hearts, that, freed from disordered affections, they may so deal with the things of this passing world as to hold rather to the things that eternally endure". May this Lent be a time of special grace for each of us. As we are approaching the paschal feast of death and resurrection of lord Jesus Christ let us prepare ourselves for that celebration by dying to sinful ways and rising to new life with Jesus.


CWL MILKBAG COLLECTION THIS WEEKEND

REGISTRATION FOR PASCHAL TRIDUUM SERVICES



The Paschal Triduum is the celebration of Jesus' Passion, Death and Resurrection. It is the highest point of the Liturgical Year because we celebrate His great sacrifice for love of us. Through Him, we are redeemed. We will be celebrating Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday services here at St. Patrick Parish and we welcome you to join us in person.

Due to the pandemic, registration for these services is required. Registration will open on Mon, Mar 22. Please visit our website (www.stpatrickshamilton.ca) for the link. Alternatively, you can call our office and register over the phone. You must register 1 ticket per person for your family/group. There is no need to register a ticket for children aged 5 and under. Registration is free. There are a limited number of tickets, so please register as soon as possible.

The schedule of Paschal Triduum services is as follows:

April 1:

- Holy Thursday Mass, 7 PM April 2
- Good Friday Liturgy, 3 PM
- Stations of the Cross, 7 PM April 3
- Easter Vigil, 8 PM April 4
- Easter Sunday Mass, 9 AM, 11:30 AM & 7:15 PM

Please note that all of these services (except for the 9 AM Easter Sunday Mass) will be live-streamed in the event that you are unable to register.

When you are here, we ask that you help us maintain the safety of all by abiding by the COVID19 safety precautions (i.e. wearing a mask, maintaining social distance). If you do not feel well or develop any COVID-19 symptoms (fever or chills, coughing – new or worsening, sore throat, trouble swallowing, runny/stuffy nose or nasal congestion, digestive issues: nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, decrease or loss of smell or taste, pink eye, extreme tiredness, sore muscles) prior to the mass you have registered to attend, please stay home.
