What Happens Here Doesn't Stay Here

HUMILITY THROUGH HARDSHIP

A few of my Pastoral Team members and I were having a conversation last Friday which incidentally was the day chosen to celebrate the Homeless Memorial mass where we honor the dignity of the homeless and vulnerable who have passed away in our community. We were talking about a crazy passing storm that blew through the Hamilton area on the Thursday evening before. It was an interesting discussion and all three of us were on the same wavelength, sharing the same thoughts and feelings.

I had been out with another team member Thursday evening and was on the expressway heading home, driving through that horrible wind and rain. Thunder & lightning lit up the sky. I remember thinking it was terrible to be out in that weather amongst others on the same road – some taking it easy, while others drove almost as if nothing was any different, like the massive storm didn't even phase them. What were they thinking!

While I was driving I was also thinking about those who utilize our services at the Door every day, who either live on the streets or in encampments. What were they experiencing during that torrential rain and wind? Where were they? Were they safe? I then thought about how blessed I was to be in my car, dry and protected from the outside elements? Yes, I got wet when I had to walk to my front door after parking the car and then found my flower planters were all toppled over and upside down from the wind, but what a blessing to be able to say that that was all I had to deal with.

Another team member experienced the storm differently, choosing to run and play in that rain with her husband. They were enjoying the gift of rain after such a long stretch of very hot and extremely humid weather. For days it had been worrisome thinking about our poor & marginalized out in that brutal and unrelenting heat. The rain may have been a relief for them, but now the rain likely left their belongings and beds soaked.

When we're hot, typically we head inside to cool off and enjoy our central-air cooled spaces. Too many others aren't

so fortunate and we really need to remember that. They are people. Human beings. They have faces. They have names. They are someone's child and/or someone's parent. They too are a child of God. There is so much that we all take for granted every single day. So many different situations we find ourselves in with easy answers to making things better for ourselves, without having to give it even an ounce of thought.



Although the three of us all live in different parts of the city, we all went through that same storm. And although the experience of the storm was different for each of us, it brought us all to thinking about the homeless and vulnerable in the city who were also caught in that rain. Were there also others in the city who thought the same? Sometimes it's hard to remember them, but we must do our very best to take a moment to stop to think about the many men, women, children and seniors who so desperately need our help, even if only in the form of prayer. Remember the next time you are experiencing something that isn't the easiest or if you see someone going through hardships that you could never imagine yourself going through, just for a moment put yourself in their shoes and try hard to remember the words, 'there but for the grace of God, go l'.

VOCATIONS REFLECTION

BEING SIGNS OF HOPE



The prophet Isaiah speaks words of hope, reminding his listeners that God is always faithful, always present, and that God rights whatever is out of order. This "righting" was put in very concrete terms: prisoners set free, the blind see, the deaf hear, etc. God's love would be extended to the poorest in society, those who had been pushed to the margins and forgotten or neglected.

Based on Jesus' teaching, James admonished the community to give equal respect and dignity to all, rich and poor alike. They were to go another step further and help provide for the needs of the poor in their midst.

Through his actions, Jesus teaches the disciples of old and new how our relationship with God is to be lived out. Jesus spoke of God's love and his teaching flowed out of his intimate relationship with Him. Experiencing the depth and wonder of God's love, Jesus concretized that love in his actions which so often focused on "righting" what was out of order. In each case, his actions were deeply personal and intimate. Jesus did not simply pray over someone and ask God to heal, but rather often took the person aside, in private for an intimate encounter.

The heart of the Oblate charism is to "proclaim the Good News to the poor". As Jesus demonstrates, and St. Francis of Assisi reminds us, our actions are more effective than our words. Both our words and our actions are to flow from, and be informed by, our intimate relationship with the Trinity. St. James also reminds us that our words of faith are to inform our actions. As we reflect on our universal vocation as disciples, and our particular vocations within that discipleship, we are challenged by one question today: Do my actions continue Jesus' mission and ministry of "righting what is out of order"? As we look to the future, we might ask ourselves "To what more am I being called as a disciple?" Might I be called to live the Oblate charism as a vowed religious or a lay Associate?

CWL PRAYER SHAWL BLESSING


