




BEYOND THE WALLS

VOCATIONS REFLECTION

LORD, INCREASE OUR FAITH!



I often find myself asking God for some favour when I'm in a tough situation. Don't we all! The disciples ask the Lord to increase their faith. Perhaps they are feeling inadequate, or perhaps they want to be the kind of disciples that are worthy of their call. Whatever their motivation, Jesus' response to them is telling. He doesn't offer to increase their faith but challenges them to live the gift of faith they have been given by God.

Jesus reminds the disciples that if their faith were the size of a mustard seed, they could do wondrous things. Paul reminds Timothy of the same truth. What are we to make of the readings today?

Jesus isn't telling the disciples they need a "larger seed" (more faith). In using the image of a mustard seed, he is reminding them that even such a small seed can produce amazing results – it bursts forth in the right conditions and produces a large plant. In the parable of the mustard seed, Jesus says it produces a large tree in which even the birds of the air can build

a home. Pretty amazing stuff from a seed so small! Paul reminds Timothy to rekindle the gift of faith. In the Jerusalem Bible translation, he says to "fan into a flame the gift of God...". He implies that the gift of faith is a small ember that can produce a large flame.

As disciples of Jesus, we are challenged by this Sunday's readings to use the gift we have been given. We don't need to ask for more. Perhaps we need to look at the word faith as a verb rather than a noun. Faith is to be lived, to be active, alive. Paul reminds Timothy that we were not given "a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love". We are called to build God's Kingdom through living our faith, through acts of love, kindness, compassion, forgiveness. We are not called to be spectators, but rather to be people of action, living our faith as fully as possible in all our thoughts, words and actions. Jesus reminds us that even small actions done in faith can have incredible results, just as a small mustard seed can explode into a large plant. Do we believe that? Let our prayer be "Lord, help me live my faith", trusting that it is enough.

MISSIONARY OBLATES OF MARY IMMACULATE REFLECT ON THE NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

The Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate join people across Turtle Island in observing the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and reflecting on the tragic and ongoing suffering brought about by Canada's residential school system.

As Oblates, we recognize and repent for the central role our religious order played in the operation of this system, and the intergenerational suffering of so many Indigenous Peoples. Today, and every day, we commit ourselves to supporting and accompanying Indigenous Peoples on the long journey towards healing and reconciliation.

Over the last year, as part of this commitment, the Oblates have humbly undertaken renewed efforts to support Indigenous Peoples in discovering truth and seeking justice, including:

- Partnerships and collaboration with archives across Canada, including the Provincial Archives of Alberta, the Royal BC Museum and the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation (NCTR), to make Oblate records as easily and widely available to Indigenous communities, researchers and journalists as is legislatively allowable;
- Welcomed archivists from the NCTR to the Oblate General Archives in Rome, granting full access to any materials that may relate to the residential school legacy;
- The continued transfer and digitization of all Oblate records related to residential schools, totaling over 65,000 records transferred;
- Advocated for Oblate priest Johannes Rivoire to participate in a legal trial in Canada, and actively supported the Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated's trip to France to identify avenues for justice;
- Supported the Canadian Conference of Catholics Bishops' efforts to see Pope Francis engage with Indigenous Peoples on Canadian soil and deliver an historic apology for the participation of the Catholic

Church in the residential school system; and

• Provided access to the Oblate House in Rome for Indigenous delegates during their meetings with Pope Francis this March.

We strive to lead with integrity and intent on this journey, while knowing there is much more we must do. We cannot speak to the progress made in the last year to support discovering truth, seeking justice and the healing journeys of Survivors and families without addressing the re-traumatization many Indigenous Peoples have suffered from seeing stories of abuse in the national discourse by current or former Oblates. Clergy sexual abuse is a tragedy, and the Oblates have a moral, ethical and pastoral responsibility to do all we can to support those who have the courage to come forward.

As we continue to commit ourselves to Truth and Reconciliation, we understand that consultation with Indigenous Peoples on how we may best support those suffering must continue to be a top priority. We respectfully commit to continued consultation and engagement with Indigenous Nations, Peoples and communities, walking an ongoing path toward reconciliation.

The Red Mass will be held: Sunday, October 02, 2022 at the Basilica of Christ the King 4.00 PM, all are welcome.

A Red Mass: is a Mass celebrated annually in the Roman Catholic Church for all members of the legal profession, regardless of religious affiliation: judges, lawyers, law school professors, law students, and government officials, marking the opening of the judicial year.

Originating in Europe during the High Middle Ages, the Red Mass is so-called from the red vestments traditionally worn in symbolism of the tongues of fire (the Holy Spirit) that descended on the Apostles at Pentecost (Acts 2:1–4)

The "Red Mass" is an historical tradition within the Catholic Church dating back to the Thirteenth Century, it marks the opening of the Fall Assizes of the Supreme Court of Ontario.


