Many participants who use the services of many of the Parish Ministries are vulnerable, have poor coping skills and few boundaries, please keep within ministry guidelines to make interactions with them successful.

Remember that all volunteers and participants have the right to be treated with dignity and respect.

Please know that your service within this faith community and the outreach ministries are greatly appreciated, and these guidelines are here to protect each other and the vulnerable participants we minister to, making their lives become a little more bearable.

# **VOCATIONS REFLECTION**

## THEY WILL WELCOME YOU INTO THE TENTS OF ETERNITY



In Amos' time about 670 B.C., there was an era of great social and economic prosperity. The elite swindled and exploited the poor, and imposed impossible debts on the them. So, Amos denounces the unscrupulous merchants for their false piety, their avarice, their dishonest practices and their exploitation of the poor. It is very easy for us to be split-brained people thinking about religion at Sunday worship and then eager to get back to our routine business as soon as possible. If so, then we too inherit Amos' and Jesus' warning: "You cannot serve God and wealth." One or the other has to be the master and take precedence in our lives.

Today's Gospel is not about moral advice. Rather, it tells us how to live now in the hope of eternity. It is meant to engage us and make us see that the Gospel is about a life-and-death decision, the most important we shall ever make. Jesus asks his followers to take more interest in their future than the steward of his parable took in his own. The steward in the parable ensures his own future by doing favours to others, but does this by cheating his master. And Jesus commends him, not for his dishonesty, but for taking an interest in the future. The steward is able to look ahead and see that after he is fired for his incompetence, he will have little prospect of getting another job. Basically, he foresees his future and thus provides for it. If our best future lies in heaven, then we all must take an active interest in our future.

But when should our interest in the future begin? When we become old and sickly? Absolutely not, our future begins now. Our future is purchased by our present. In today, we already see tomorrow. The prophet Amos looked at the future of his people and began denouncing and protesting against the values of his present generation. Amos believed that unless his people took drastic steps or action against these false practices, there was no future security for them. Yes, our eternal destiny is a future gift but it is also a present reality. We should never forget that the only way we can predict our future is to use and exercise our power in the present time in order to shape that future.

But how can we shape our future now, in the present? Jesus gives us some guidance regarding how we should shape our future. We are warned not to amass wealth and money. Most of our experience will tell us that money comes and goes. Jesus is suggesting to us that we use our money wisely. One way of using our money wisely is to give to the poor. In fact, those who receive our money become friends now and in heaven.

The second guideline that Jesus makes on how to shape our future is the one who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great. (Lk16:10). By doing little things well, we can make our life great, as the responsible use of little things on this earth will determine our reward in heaven. Similarly, when we neglect little deeds of kindness, little words of love or little words of forgiveness, we are also neglecting our duty to shape our future which is a kingdom of love, unity and peace.

As Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta put it, we can't all do great things, but we can all do small things with great love. Our vocation here on earth, and our best way of assuring our future in heaven, as well as living in the kingdom of God here and now, is to live those words – to do all things with great love. Or as Sir Winston Churchill said, "We make a living by what we get; we make a life by what we give away."

# FAR BEYOND THE WALLS

Just how far is that, one may ask? I'll say that distance may be measured in many ways but the difference that really matters is about the felt presence of my faith when I am in and out of the church proper. Perhaps this more than anything asks the question: where is my faith after I walk out of the church building? There may be many answers to this question but that is where we can begin to change some of our ideas about where God lives and what is his true domain. Many will say that God is relegated to holy places and other places worthy of being Host to the Almighty.

If we take God into our hearts, it is said he will always be with us. If we freely allow God access to exercise his will in our lives, then there is no place He cannot go. Recently I had the opportunity to travel to a beautiful community in northern Manitoba called St Theresa Point. Each year, for the past 39 years, they have had a faith family retreat at a sacred place known as Sandy Bar. This openair camping event is open to the 5,000 residents of the community. If anyone is proficient in how to take our faith beyond the church, it is St Therese. You see, earlier this past year their beautiful Church burned down. There is a temporary place to pray in on Sundays but the people of St Therese know that God lives in them and cannot be constrained to any one place.

There is no place that God cannot be with us in this, His creation, which includes within all of us. Sometimes it is difficult to see him in all the noise and distractions we may face. To quiet one's heart is not unlike creating a place beyond the walls where we can meet the heart of our creator and slowly discover the plan that He has for us in our own life. If God is connected to all creation, then we may begin to see a way to reach our troubled world. Beginning at home and the most familiar people and places, and then moving outward, we can hope to increase our awareness of what God has created. On the other hand, what we have created with our hands may be wondrous, but cannot be outdone by what only God can create.

Whether we find ourselves in a far away place, which is new and refreshing, or merely one step beyond the church door. We will find ourself in the kingdom of God; where we are coworkers with Jesus and love is our greatest tool. Amen

### PARISH DIRECTOR OF COMMUNICATIONS

### Nature of Position:

The Parish Director of Communications (DC) is a member of the parish staff that works with the pastor and staff to utilize all communication tools at the parish's disposal in order to (1) promote the overall mission of the parish. (2) encourage engagement and tithing among the parish family.

The Director of Communications would be **de facto** of the Parish Finance Council and Pastoral Team.

### **Reporting Function:**

Reports only to the Pastor or his designate.

### Job Description:

Duties may include any of the following:

• Facilitates the parish's utilization of the multiple means of digital and print communication

(web, bulletin, newsletter, social media). This role includes (though not exhaustive) the following tasks:

- Optimizing website communications, keeping website events and information up to date. (website needs to be revamped).
- Governing all Church communications, both print and digital
- Look into email marketing program (ie. Mailchimp, for sending out bulletin & other parish updates
- Developing and facilitating a strategy for social media channels
- Overseeing church platforms like a blog, social media, podcast, and/or church app
- Managing the use or creation of design assets
- Takes responsibility for ensuring the facilitation of live streaming, liturgies and other events as is necessary, (and perhaps livestream themselves in cases of necessity).
- Include organizing live-stream volunteers and training new volunteers.
- Makes Mass slides, (including coordinating with music ministries, pastor, pastoral assistant to create accurate slides, or delegate mass slides to be made by volunteers.
- Initiate and update of the parish database system, including the possibility of exploring other database software to effectively communicate with parish tithing as a Christian way of life.
- Utilize the communication means of the parish, so that parishioners are encouraged to grow in faith by returning God's gift of time, talent and treasures in service to the Church and community.
- Collaborate with other parish leaders to collect and analyze data for pastoral planning (ie parish census, needs assessment, interest surveys, or area demographic research).
- Train volunteers (ie with working bulletin, live streaming, etc.).

- Coordinates Mission with Youth team of adults and youths
- Develops close communications with and mutual support from families of youth.
- Collaborates with other community and parish organizations and offices
- Focuses the Parish community on the spiritual needs and gifts of youth
- Strive in reaching the goals of Oblate Ministry with Youth people.

### Job Responsibilities:

- **To** strive to lead young people to experience and share the love of God in Jesus Christ Crucified.
- To mature in faith through the experience of an Oblate Community.
- To responsibly participate in the life, mission and work of the Catholic faith Community.

### Program Development:

- To coordinate a core group of adults and youths to determine and direct programs and services, (offering them proper training and opportunities for leadership development).
- To develop the kind of relationship with parents that are conducive to open communication between parents and youth.
- To plan, schedule, and lead (or train leaders) for an annual retreat for teens, and for youths, focusing on some aspect of spiritual growth.
- Provide programs for social outreach and service, directly involving parish teens and young adults, to provide pastoral reflections on their experiences prior to, during and after the experience.
- To arrange seasonal or occasional small group Bible Study or reflection groups.
- To offer occasional gatherings for teens and for young adults.
- To provide pastoral guidance to teens and parents as needed on an individual basis and help teens and parents find professional referrals when needed.
- To arrange occasional parenting program for parents of teens and pre-teens
- Create or acquire other programs reflecting the components of Mission with youth as needed.
- Provide a catechetical component in youth and young adults gatherings, and offer catechesis in other practical ways.
- Works in collaboration with Diocesan Youth Ministry and Young Adults Ministries offices.
- Work in collaboration with the Oblate Vocation Office.
- Activate a strong Parish-School relationship through involvement in school life (i.e. helping during religious classes, sacramental prep, class visits etc.)

### Goals: Following St. Eugene De Mazenod's inspiration we are guided by three goals.

• In becoming Human, we endeavor to accompany young people towards their integral growth, to help them recognize their great dignity and that of others.


