# **VOCATIONS REFLECTION**

# WHEN IT FEELS LIKE GOD IS ABSENT

"Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was." John 11:5-6

Have you ever felt like God was absent in a particular moment of your life? Maybe you were struggling in your relationship and it felt like you were left on your own. Maybe you experienced the pain of illness in your family or even the death of a loved one, but you prayed so much for healing and recovery. Maybe you felt lost in challenging circumstances, and you felt helpless and abandoned. It felt so real, as if God was absent... But was he?

When Lazarus got sick, Martha and Mary sought Jesus' help. After all, they were good friends! They sent an urgent message to him, "Lord, the man you love is ill." Their hope was that he would drop everything and come and cure him. But surprisingly Jesus didn't drop everything and rush to the bedside of his dying friend. Instead, he stayed on where he was for two whole days. We don't know why. His delay in coming must have been heartbreaking for the sisters. Especially when Lazarus eventually died.

When Jesus finally showed up, Martha didn't hesitate to express her frustration and disappointment, "Lord, if you had been here, our brother would not have died." Sound familiar? When something bad happens to us or to our loved ones, we can't help thinking that if God really cared about us, if he really loved us, then he wouldn't have allowed this thing to

happen. We feel abandoned by God. We feel like he has left us alone.

Max Lucado, in his book, *Six Hours One Friday*, tells the story of a missionary in Brazil who discovered a tribe of Indigenous in a remote part of the jungle. They lived near a large river. The tribe was in need of medical attention. A contagious disease was ravaging the population. People were dying daily.

A hospital was not too far away – just across the river, but the people would not cross it because they believed it was inhabited by evil spirits. To enter the water would mean certain death. The missionary explained how he had crossed the river and was unharmed. They were not convinced. He then took them to the bank and placed his hand in the water. They still wouldn't go in. He walked into the water up to his waist and splashed water on his face. It didn't matter.

They were still afraid to enter the river. Finally, he dove into the river, swam beneath the surface until he emerged on the other side. It was then that the Indians broke out into cheers and followed him across.

That's exactly what Jesus did!

The Paschal Mystery, the culminating event of the Lenten season, reminds us that Jesus immersed himself into human existence. He took on our suffering, pain and death. And even though sometimes it feels like he was absent, he is right there, suffering along with us in order to give us a new life. "Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; 26 and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?"" John 11:25-26

# **BEYOND THE WALLS**

# IT'S NOT TOO LATE

Many people have an imaginary line that tells them when certain situations are beyond repair. This line will vary for many and it seems that it can become quite unmovable for reasons of fear or anger. The reality is that everyone has the ability to rethink their position on a decision that they have made. Why then, does it seem so difficult for people to recant their decisions regarding certain people and the situations that led them to be so immovable?

One reason could be that personal values may have been insulted to the point where defense mechanisms take over in order to protect one's values. Many unresolved disputes have come about because of what was said and then a vow made in protest because of personal boundaries. Most times, these lines that have been crossed can simply be dealt with through a reconciliation or new understanding. By working things out in this way we release ourselves from the burden that a broken relationship is. Still, this forgiveness may not come easily and long-term grudges will persist. This unwillingness to let go and forgive the other's transgressions against us can become deep seeded and take root blocking any and all efforts that might move towards a resolution. Sometimes it happens that when ties are cut, the chance to forgive disappears with that person unto death. If only it ended there, but some pass this on to others and to the family.

Little do we realize, that letting go of these wounds doesn't mean we need to forget or have the experience erased from our memories. We simply make peace within ourselves and with God to no longer continue reviving the experience anymore. The whole matter becomes one of gaining some wisdom about what broken trust means. Like the person who continues to be hurt because of not having their boundaries respected, it can remain like a sharp pain for a long time.

The reason I say in the title, "It's not too late" is because it is never too late to make a different choice about living in the hurt. There is a choice that respects us, our lives and the lives of others. We have the

opportunity to grow beyond our choice to be stuck in that hard feeling but there is no foolproof way in how we do this. If we want to live without reconciliation, this is a free choice, but this then means that there is no chance for moving forward.

Remain hopeful that even when all has been undone or discarded, there is still a way to renew ourselves; even if vou believe it is too late for reconciliation. There is much to be said about making things right in our hearts. The process always begins when a person chooses to turn away from the offense and then claims 100% of their own responsibility in it. This is the same for each person and is both the most and the least that we need to do. This being said, the wider part of our healing will happen when

we turn to each other as brothers and sisters in a spirit of love and real concern for them. If we turn towards those who need forgiveness and say: "I forgive you, go in peace, I hold no more ill will towards your indignities".

Living in peace does not require us to turn a blind eye to our bad choices but merely to seek forgiveness for the ways in which we have offended. If we courageously do this, our imperfect self can begin to realign. It is not too late. While we have breath in our bodies, we have the chance to improve ourselves, but it is our choice after all.

Remember "Love one another as you have been loved and treat your neighbor as you would have them treat you." Matt 22: 37ff & Matt. 6:12.
