### St. Mary's Secondary School Presentations at Mount Mary







De Mazenod Door Outreach is certainly on the radar of St. Mary's High School. Over the years, students have raised much-needed funds through various initiatives to support our guests, and we greatly appreciate St. Mary's and their dedicated support.

This past week, I (Sherri Ramirez, Director of Social Action, Outreach & Guest Relations), met with almost 200 grade 9 students over 3 days at Mount Mary Retreat Centre to share more in depth information about De Mazenod Door Outreach and our programs. Each day was filled with youthful energy and a willingness to learn about both the De Mazenod Door and the social teaching of the church being the hands and feet of Christ! We talked about the importance of both charity and justice and how they must work together to provide a more just society. We asked the students what kind of world they would like to live in. They responded by identifying many of the same adjectives each day: safe, free, peaceful, inclusive. However, on the third day, the students gave 15 incredible answers to this question. They clearly described the kind of world they would like to live in. We challenged them to be critical thinkers, to ask questions and analyze the systems that create poverty, and how important it is for all of us to use our voices to speak out against injustice. After the students listened to the two guests in our videos and heard directly from them about their daily struggles with food insecurity, and the most basic of needs like "having to steal toilet paper because you don't have money to buy some", you could have heard a pin drop. No one had any questions or comments: only the look of gratitude, that this was not their story.

My dog Jax was with me for each of the presentations. While still a 125 pound puppy, he is training to be a certified Emotional Support animal. His presence and demeanor was very calming and his involvement played an integral part, considering the number of students attending daily. Jax has become well known in the St. Mary's school community, and was welcomed by all of the staff & students. ~Sherri Ramirez

### **VOCATION REFLECTION**

### In Defense of Sheep

The scripture passages for the Fourth Sunday of Easter have always left me with mixed feelings. Don't get me wrong, I can get behind the concept of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. I mean, really, let's be honest, it's a serene and picturesque image at first, isn't it? Jesus, benevolently wandering a peaceful meadow, staff in hand, looking after a flock of docile, fluffy white animals, calling them by name. Pretty adorable if you ask me. (So adorable, in fact, that there are enough plastic shepherds and plush sheep in Catholic toy boxes to make me wonder just how long Fisher-Price's marketing team has actually been around.)

First comes the image, then comes the exegesis – the critical interpretation of the biblical text to discover its intended meaning – and the scene shifts from tranquil to semi-chaotic. More often than not, it's rather amusing. Always in a mess of some sort, always under threat, always in some sort of ridiculous bind of their own creation (and usually stuck head first), the explanations we hear typically bring us to the conclusion that the sheep need a shepherd to rely on because they're infinitely stupid.

The image is still cute. And now funny, too. Until I remember that the sheep are a metaphor. Hahaha! That's so adorab— heyyyyy....

Convinced that the sheep and I both are getting a bad rap, I did what any reasonable person would do: I went hunting on Google to find whatever I needed to vindicate us. It wasn't hard. I typed in, "are sheep stupid?" and legions of people stood united to defend their honour and reputation. (And therefore, by metaphorical extension, mine.)

It turns out that sheep are remarkably intelligent. (Why, thank you.) They learn quickly, they have impressive memories and excellent recognition skills, they are part of complex social structures, and they are capable of delivering a painful kick to anyone who annoys them. (Yeah... that tracks...) In fact, my favourite line came from an animal scientist who said "sheep are smarter than you think they are. You just have to be smart enough to recognize it."

There. Off the hook.

But in my quest to transcend the 'stupid' stereotype, I learned that part of the reason sheep tend to get into trouble is because they are sometimes too smart for their own good. They're actually remarkable escape artists. If you're trying to maneuver them in a particular direction, and they don't want to go that way, they'll head the other way. If you want one sheep in particular, and try to single it out, it'll head for someplace where it figures you can't reach it. And that's when they get into trouble.

I'd love to say that this doesn't apply to me, but deep down, I know that it applies far too well to plausibly deny it, especially when it comes to my vocation. Over the course of my life, it seems that more often than not, when I'm summoned by my Shepherd to a particular field, I'm inclined to head in the other direction. And I assure you, it's not because I'm too dumb to follow directions: my decisions are calculated ones. Sometimes, I don't want to go where he's calling me because I know it's a long and difficult road to get there. Sometimes I don't want to be in the field he's standing in because it's unfamiliar or uncomfortable. Sometimes I don't want to stay where he tells me to, because the grass looks much greener on the other side. And every time, I decide I'm going to go my way, not his.

And that's precisely why I need a shepherd. When I make a break for it, someone needs to bring me back in line. When I get in trouble because I've escaped and managed to end up where I shouldn't be, someone needs to bail me out. And when I march off in search of greener pastures, my shepherd guides me home (again, and again, and again) and reminds me, 'No, I need you here. In this field. With me."

And so, this year, on Good Shepherd Sunday, it's actually the smart sheep who remind me again of my need to heed my Shepherd's voice. It's not because I'm dumb. It's because I've learned that when my Shepherd calls me by name, it's likely because I've gotten too smart for my own good and have decided to do things my way. I've been called to a particular field

for a reason, and when I hear my Shepherd's voice, I remember that my place is by his side.

### Wearing of the Green



### CATHOLIC EDUCATION WEEK



Catholic Education Week 2023 begins on Sunday, April 30, 2023. The Catholic schools in our parish will engage in a series of events to celebrate the ongoing gift of publicly funded Catholic education. You are invited to learn about the various celebrations that are happening in your children's school, and are welcome to attend, if possible. Publicly funded Catholic education has existed in Ontario since 1841 and its graduates have served Ontario and Canada very well. The current generation of students in our publicly funded Catholic schools will serve with the same spirit and generosity as their previous generations.

This year's Catholic Education Week theme is, "We are Many, We are One."

The theme for Catholic Education Week 2023 was inspired by the following considerations:

The Church worldwide has embarked on a synodal process, "a synod on synodality," which centres on intentional listening: listening to each other and listening to the Holy Spirit. We have each been asked to actively reach out and listen to the voices and experiences of people where they are at and consider what steps the Holy Spirit is inviting us to take as we walk together. As the Catholic Bishops of Ontario highlighted in Renewing the Promise, "It is about taking the time to walk alongside one another, to listen and to teach, and in doing so, to transform."

Ongoing recognition of the Truth & Reconciliation Commission and the importance of Indigenous culture and spirituality as we move forward together.

The Ministry of Education's focus on Inclusion and Equity resonates with all educators and administrators as we desire to serve all of God's children and Pope Francis' encyclical entitled, Fratelli Tutti, will guide us in this good work.

The challenges to personal and spiritual well-being posed by the uncertainty of the current global crisis makes the timing and the concerns of Mental Health Week, which takes place during the same week as Catholic Education Week, all the more relevant.
