

## **BEYOND THE WALLS**

## JUSTICE IN ACTION

The hands of service must be followed by the voice of Justice!

On May 10th, 2023 I had the privilege of accompanying one of the young men from De Mazenod Housing's 'Eugene's Place' as he was one of the guest speakers at the 20th anniversary and AGM of the CAWDB (Campaign for Adequate Welfare and Disability Benefits). This group has been gathering and supporting each other through some of life's most difficult struggles that poverty inflicts upon them. Their voices may not be pretty or eloquent, but it is their story and it needs to be heard and respected. Justice in action!

The opportunity to share his struggles are empowering for Shannon Cleary, and as he so eloquently expresses "not having a voice while trying so hard just to survive, feeling like I am finally getting my life back together only to have a system pull it away again". This long-term system as Shannon describes this constant struggle continues to raise his anxiety and feeling of helplessness and is slowly chipping away his dignity.

As we at the De Mazenod Door continue to do our best to meet the ever growing needs of the community, we need to start asking some really important questions. Why are we seeing so many new faces at the De Mazenod Door? Taking a much deeper look at the systems that are forcing more and more people to live in poverty. As taxpayers and fellow Hamiltonians we should be deeply disturbed by what we are seeing. We should be asking ourselves, does this disturb me enough to do something about it? What can I do? I am only one person. Step out in faith!

One person can inspire many to speak out and use our voices against the unjust systems that continue to force people into desperation. Sign petitions, write the newspaper, contact politicians, get involved in community groups who are advocating for a more just society.

We as a community should never become so complacent that we accept these injustices as societal or cultural norms. We need to stop blaming the poor for living in poverty and roll up our sleeves and work together to find concrete solutions to fix the systems that continue to perpetuate the stripping away of one's human dignity.

There have been many studies and documentaries on homelessness, mental health and addictions and the long term effects of each. Many words have been used over the years to emphasize the severity of this global crisis and one that continues to pierce my heart is from an article in the Hamilton Spectator from 2016. Josie D'Amico (who happens to be a wonderful, long-time friend) refers to the definition of 'Genocide' outlined at the United Nations Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of Crime of Genocide in this article and boldly suggests that people living in poverty be added to that list and specifically labeling the current Welfare and Disability System a 'slow genocide'.

I have been working in the trenches of injustice and poverty for a number years in the inner city of Hamilton and I definitely see it as our modern day genocide.

In memory of Megan Bay, who passed away this past weekend from an overdose. Yet another soul lost to the streets of injustice.

## **VOCATION REFLECTION**

## FLIP IT UPSIDE DOWN

A few years ago, when I was teaching high school, I went into the art classroom one day with a question for the art teacher. I waited off to the side as she worked with a student who was frustrated about a part of her painting that just didn't seem to be coming together for her. After talking it over for a few moments, the teacher lifted the canvas from the easel, flipped it end for end, and put it back down so that the image was now upside down. They studied it together for a moment, and suddenly, the student's frown disappeared, and she said "I've got it." She picked up her brush, and returned to her work with a new intensity. I was astounded. How on earth did that make a difference? "She's been standing in front of that painting for three weeks," her teacher explained. "It's so familiar to her that she's stuck in the way she sees it and thinks about it. But as soon as it was flipped upside down, she knew exactly what to do because she saw it in a new way." Brilliant.

What does this have to do with the gospel for Ascension Sunday (Mt 28.16-20)? For many of us, we've heard this gospel so often that sometimes we get stuck in the way we think about it, too. So, what happens if we try the same approach and flip it on its head, reading it from the end? When we do, we the first thing we hear is the promise that Jesus is with us, always. This kind of changes the tone of things, doesn't it? Instead of a list of tasks with a parting "Don't worry, you've got this," at the end, everything the disciples are asked to do begins with Jesus. As it should be. As Christian disciples, Jesus isn't an afterthought. He's the reason for what they do in the first place. Neat, huh? Let's keep reading.

Then the disciples are called to teach people. Teach them about what? About love, peace, patience, gentleness, mercy, compassion, generosity, and about the Kingdom of God, where these qualities are woven into its very ethos. They're called to teach others about acting justly, about reaching out to the marginalized, about caring for the poor and the voiceless, about giving their time, talents, and treasure to the building of that Kingdom. And they're to teach about Jesus, the King himself, who lived those very same qualities and died for doing those very same things. They're called to baptize people. They are called to receive others into the Body of Christ, the ruler of that same Kingdom, who leads by example. They're called to accept every person into the very heart of the family, to embrace and welcome them in such a way that every last one of them knows, deep down, that they are a beloved child of God.

They're called to make disciples. The disciples' own relationship with Jesus, their identity as God's children, the indwelling of the Holy Spirit that will come to them on Pentecost will give them not only the motivation but the very capability of inspiring others to follow Jesus Christ. Welcome them in, and give them every reason to stay and get excited, themselves. Disciples make disciples. And they're told to GO. They can't teach people, baptize them, and make them disciples out of them if they stay put. This calling from Jesus, this vocation, means that they have to follow his example by being — and bringing — the Good News to everyone. Everyone. To the people who are considered unwelcome in the community. To the disinterested. To those who have been failed by others. To those who have failed others, themselves. Not a single person gets left out. Not one.

But the best part about reading this story backward is that it paints, very clearly, a picture of our own vocations. You see, at the very beginning of the scripture passage, it says "the eleven disciples went to Galilee..." But if you keep reading further backwards in this gospel, you'll find that there are usually twelve disciples mentioned. That means there is a space for us in this calling. We've been given the same job: teach, baptize, make disciples, and do it by going out to the world. Because we, ourselves, are the twelfth disciple. Sometimes, the best sources of clarity and insight come from a painting that gets flipped upside down.

St. Eugene De Mazenod is the founder of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate. He was born into an aristocratic family in southern France shortly before the French Revolution, and experienced the exile and devastation of that time. After a conversion, Eugene entered a seminary in Paris and was ordained a priest in 1811.

Seeing the state of the Church and of the people, he chose to work with the poor and the rejected, to preach missions and to organize a youth association to "... lead people to act like human beings first of all and then like Christians and finally... saints."

The task was so vast that he soon gathered other priests to join him and in 1816 started the "Missionaries of Provence." Within ten years, this group developed into what is now the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate.

Today, over 3,400 Oblates carry forward the missionary vision of St. Eugene across seventy countries around the world.
